




Wetland Map, 400 W. North, Tuhey Park



1. INTRODUCTION

This feasibility study was completed as a collaboration between architects Neil Hoerstman of Hoerstman Design Studio and Jonathan Spodek, FAIA for the Muncie Parks Department. The goal of the study is to determine the feasibility for the former Tuhey Poo Bathhouse to be reused as a space for community gatherings similar to that of the McCulloch Park Lodge. It is the opinion of authors that this building is eligible for the National Register of Historic Places.

This feasibility study is a tool developed to guide future decisions for the reuse of the Tuhey Bathhouse. It is not a comprehensive set of specifications for future work on the building. During the development of this study, meetings with stakeholders helped guide and develop the designs and objectives the building's reuse. It has been determined that the overarching goal for the Tuhey Bathhouse is to have it available to the public as an accessible meeting and gathering space with two great rooms, storage areas for tables and chairs, toilet facilities, and a kitchenette for each great room.

The Tuhey Bathhouse Feasibility Study includes:

- Development of final use options as defined by the stakeholders;
- Recommendation of the overall treatment approach of Rehabilitation, known as the treatment philosophy, based on the Secretary of the Interior Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties;
- Development of schematic floor plans for the final use;
- Review of the building for accessibility;
- Initial cost estimates based on 2024 pricing.

Secretary of Interior's Standards for The Treatment of Historic of Historic Properties

The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties embody two important goals: 1) the preservation of historic materials and 2) the preservation of a building's distinguishing character. Any necessary repairs or modifications made for reuse of the building should follow several basic principles common to the maintenance of historic buildings and are adapted from The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties published by the National Park Service.

- Modifications made to a building's exterior for new use should provide minimal impact to its existing historic materials and distinguishing features.
- Deteriorated architectural features should be repaired rather than replaced wherever possible.
- When replacement of original building material is necessary, new materials should match
 the material being replaced in composition, design, color, texture, and other visual
 qualities.
- Replacement of missing architectural features should be accurately duplicated based on historical or physical evidence rather than conjecture.

- Repair methods, such as mortar replacement, new materials should match the existing material in strength, porosity, color, texture, and other physical properties.
- Repair methods, such as surface cleaning of the building, should be undertaken using the gentlest methods possible.

These principles recognize that historic materials and details have proven records for durability and compatibility, and that a small amount of maintenance at regular intervals avoids large investments in repairs. When new materials, or accessible modifications, are incorporated into the building, care must be taken to assure that their physical properties do not conflict with the physical properties of surrounding materials. If materials are improperly applied, it may cause or accelerate physical deterioration of the historic building materials.

Rehabilitation/Adaptive Use as a Treatment and Standards

Definition of Rehabilitation

The Secretary of the Interior Standards is an established set of guidelines providing guidance to historic building owners, building managers, and stakeholders to help establish common goals for a preservation project. Discussion with stakeholders have established Adaptive Reuse and the process of Rehabilitation as the objective of work to be completed on the Tuhey Bathhouse.

Rehabilitation is defined as the act or process of making possible a compatible new use for a property through repair, alterations, and additions while preserving those portions or features which convey its historical, cultural, or architectural values.

Standards for Rehabilitation:

There 10 Guiding Principles for Rehabilitation of a historic property

- 1. A property will be used as it was historically or be given a new use that requires minimal change to its distinctive materials, features, spaces and spatial relationships.
- 2. The historic character of a property will be retained and preserved. The removal of distinctive materials or alteration of features, spaces and spatial relationships that characterize a property will be avoided.
- 3. Each property will be recognized as a physical record of its time, place and use. Changes that create a false sense of historical development, such as adding conjectural features or elements from other historic properties, will not be undertaken.
- 4. Changes to a property that have acquired historic significance in their own right will be retained and preserved.
- 5. Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property will be preserved.

- 6. Deteriorated historic features will be repaired rather than replaced. Where the severity of deterioration requires replacement of a distinctive feature, the new feature will match the old in design, color, texture and, where possible, materials. Replacement of missing features will be substantiated by documentary and physical evidence.
- 7. Chemical or physical treatments, if appropriate, will be undertaken using the gentlest means possible. Treatments that cause damage to historic materials will not be used.
- 8. Archeological resources will be protected and preserved in place. If such resources must be disturbed, mitigation measures will be undertaken.
- 9. New additions, exterior alterations, or related new construction will not destroy historic materials, features, and spatial relationships that characterize the property. The new work will be differentiated from the old and will be compatible with the historic materials, features, size, scale and proportion, and massing to protect the integrity of the property and its environment.
- 10. New additions and adjacent or related new construction will be undertaken in such a manner that, if removed in the future, the essential form and integrity of the historic property and its environment would be unimpaired.

Identification of Important Historic Features

The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties embody two important goals: 1) the preservation of historic materials and 2) the preservation of a building's distinguishing character. Every historic building is unique, with its own identity and its own distinctive character. Character refers to all the visual aspects and physical features that comprise the appearance of a historic building. Character-defining elements include the overall shape of the building, its materials, craftsmanship, decorative details, interior spaces and features, and the various aspects of its site and environment.

In order to meet the requirements of the Secretary of the Interior Standards, the identification and preservation of significant features is necessary. The Tuhey Bathhouse includes multiple character-defining features that should be retained and preserved during any preservation, restoration, or rehabilitation process. These features are what help define the building as historically important. The significant features of the building include:


Exterior Features:

- 1. Overall Shape / Form: The original shape of the building is defined by the original approximately 100-ft x 35-ft shaped plan with a projecting main entrance and projecting covered patio area towards the swimming pool. The main hipped roof defines the shape and divides the pool side into three distinctive parts the dressing rooms on each end and the covered porch in the center. The gable front projection to toward the front provide another unique feature.
- 2. *Front Entrance:* The gable front, symmetrical entrance on the buildings on the buildings front façade remains a primary character defining feature of the building. The curving stone wings coming off of each side of the projecting entrance contribute to this feature.
- 3. Window Openings: While all of the windows were removed in the 1980s renovation of the building, the masonry window openings with limestone sills remain. The size, proportion, and location of the windows provide symmetry to the exterior facades. Early photographs indicate the majority of these were 6-lite steel windows. The windows have been removed an infilled with wood panels.
- 4. *Stone Exterior Walls:* The historic exterior stone masonry defines the exterior character of the building, with a distinct color and texture, and pattern.
- 5. Stone Knee-High Retaining Walls: Knee-high stone walls extend from the front of the building along the entrance stairs and around the front and side of the buildings. These original site features are important features that extend the building into the park around it.

Interior Features:

- 1. Interior Room Configuration: The building is simply divided with a center core for utilities and a reception/ticket area. The central core is flanked on each side by men's and women's changing and shower areas. While the interior was extensively renovated in the 1980s, this basic configuration existed from the original construction in the 1930s.
- 2. Metal Truss System: There are no interior load bearing walls in the building. There are exposed metal trusses that span from the front to the rear walls throughout the building. The two large changing have not ceiling, but are open to the elaborate truss system and the underside of the roof. This is an important character defining feature that should be maintained in the building's interior.

2. Brief History of the Tuhey Bathhouse

The Tuhey Pool Bathhouse was built in 1934 as part of the Tuhey Park project, at the time Muncie's "latest addition to the city's recreation centers." The building's construction was supervised by Ed McGruff and Charles Hardley. The building was designed in the rustic style of park buildings popularized by the National Park Service at the time. According to the Field Guide for High Style and Vernacular Architecture in Indiana key features of this style are colors and materials that blend into natural surroundings, evoke qualities of ruggedness, durability and "nativeness" in order for the building to be a natural outgrowth of a park.

Tuhey Park is located along the White River on the north-west side of Muncie, Delaware County, Indiana. The Bathhouse is one of the few remaining structures from the original project. According to the Muncie Evening Press newspaper, the pool was "the second largest in the state, being second only in size to the pool in Broad Ripple Park in Indianapolis" at the time it was built. The total cost of the recreation center was approximately \$30,000, but the cost would have been "triple that sum had not CWA (Civil Works Administration) and FERA (Federal Emergency Relief Administration) labor been available". The construction of the Tuhey Pool Bathhouse provided jobs for many and a facility for recreation activities for the citizens of Muncie. The 1934 site plan included the bathhouse, the swimming pool, terraced driveway, walks and promenades.

The Pool at Tuhey park was an important site in Muncie during the Civil Rights movement. Up until the mid-1950's, the pool was not racially segregated by law or regulation but it was considered a "whites only" facility. The African American population of Muncie was meant to swim in the pool in Jackson Park. In 1945, the Jackson Park pool was shut down by the health authorities forcing the African American population to find new places to swim. The easiest to access was the White River, which was not a safe place for swimming as made fact by the drownings of several children. In 1954, the local N.A.A.C.P created a secondary pool which became the "Municipal Pool." This stop-gap measure only lasted for two years before Roy C. Buley and Levan Scott brought three African American children to the pool and paid for them to enter. This was met by ridicule and verbal attacks. The situation escalated to the point that the pool was shut down for one week. Upon its reopening, the mayor at the time, declared that the pool would no longer be segregated. This action resulted in the resignation of two members of the City Parks Board.

From the 1950's to the 1970's the pools saw continuous growth and perpetuated its role as a meeting place and major recreational space in Muncie. In the 1960's the Tuhey Park added a skating rink to allow for use year-round. It was also in the 1960's into the early 1970's that the park was used for softball games, football, long jump, and tennis in addition to swimming. The 1970's onward were a more difficult time for the pool as it suffered from poor upkeep suffered from lower usage numbers

In 1978, the Tuhey Pool was closed by order of the Board of Health as unsafe for public use. This was followed by a full renovation of the pool and bathhouse completed in 1982. The renovations to the bathhouse, including a complete reconfiguration of the interior, addition of skylights and boarding up of all the exterior windows, was designed by Graham, Love and Taylor architects.

The pool was again shut down in 2009 in order to bring the pool into compliance with new federal regulations. It reopened in 2011. The renovations to the pool included a new structure to serve as the entrance and lockers for the pool. Since that time, the historic Tuhey Bathhouse has been vacant and only used for storage.


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Enlarged detail of Tuhey Bathhouse (1950) showing the original windows

3. Accessibility

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is civil rights legislation prohibiting discrimination against individuals with disabilities "in all areas of public life, including jobs, schools, transportation, and all public and private places that are open to the general public." The ADA added to previous disability rights legislation including the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and 1975's Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

The Tuhey Bathhouse was constructed in 1934 and most recently renovated in 1982, both before the adoption of the ADA

The access to the building and building was reviewed for compliance with Title III (Public Accommodations) of the Americans with Disabilities Act and ANSI A117.1-2017 Accessible and Usable Buildings and Facilities. Title III of ADA outlines four priorities for accessibility when considering barrier removal. These include the following:

- 1. Accessible Entrance into the Facility
- 2. Access to Goods and Services
- 3. Access to Restrooms
- 4. Any other Measures Necessary

Goals for accessibility are:

- To provide equal experience and access for building users of all abilities;
- To provide an accessible route to and into the building and provide accessible circulation through the building;
- To address barriers which hinder full usage of the building for parties who have impairment in mobility, vision, hearing, grip, or strength, or who use mobility aids such as wheelchairs, walkers, or crutches
- To minimize ramps where possible in order to reduce physical travel distances and improve circulation experiences.

Goals for historic preservation are:

- To provide minimal change to the historic spaces, features, and materials present in order to make the building more fully accessible to all users.
- As laid out in The Secretary of the interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties
 - To protect and preserve the building's historic materials and details
 - To protect and preserve the building's distinguishing character defining features


Accessible entrance into the building

Currently there is no accessible entrance to the Tuhey Pool Bathhouse due to a) stairs to the front entrance and b) all exterior doors are not wide enough, do have appropriate hardware, and do not have proper clearances on either side of the door to meet current accessibility standards.

Recommendation 1 – Provide new ramp at front entrance to North Street sidewalk and drop off area.

Recommendation 2 – Replace current front double doors with a 36" wide door with sidelights and power automatic door opener in historic (and current) stone door opening.

Recommendation 3 – Replace current front steps to provide flat landing at front door



Accessible access to rear patio and swimming pool

Currently there the access to the rear patio and pool is does not meet accessibility standards as neither the clearances at the door nor the route between the walls added in 1982 provide adequate clearances or hardware.


Recommendation 1 – Replace doors to the pool with a new 36" wide door power automatic door opener.

Recommendation 2 – Remove walls added in 1982 on exterior of the bathhouse to provide a route with adequate width and turning clearances to the rear patio and pool.

Access egress from each side

Currently, there is no accessible secondary means of egress from building's locker rooms. These will become community meeting spaces and will require a second means of egress in the new use.

Recommendation 1 – Reopen and widen the original openings in the rear corner of each major space. There were originally doors in these locations that were removed and infilled in 1982. Install new 36" wide egress only doors with concrete pads on the exterior in both locations.



Accessible routes inside the building

All proposed changes to the building interior will provide accessible route from the front entrance and the poolside entrance into all major spaces of the building open to the public. This includes both community spaces, vestibules spaces, and new bathrooms.

Accessible Bathrooms

All proposed changes provide accessible bathrooms accessible to the public.

4. Repairs and Upgrades Required for All Proposed Options

Regardless of how the building is reused or reconfigured, there are a number of items that must be addressed to ensure the continued use and preservation of the building.

ROOFING - The current roof is beginning to fail and leak around the skylights

- Removed existing roofing and replace with high quality dimensional shingles
- Repair or replace wood facia at roof eave
- Remove skylights and repair roof deck at openings in anticipation of re-opening windows
- Replace roof gutters and downspouts.

WINDOWS – In the 1982 renovations, all the windows were removed and replaced with plywood panels.

- Removed existing wood panels at all locations that have not be infilled with stone and replace with new windows that have the appearance of historic steel windows.
- Refer to the enlarged photo from 1950 for window lite configuration

TREES AND SHRUBS – On the front and sides of the buildings trees and shrubs have become overgrown over time and have potential to damage building roof and foundation

- Removed existing trees and shrubs on the front and sides of the buildings
- Removed built up mulch against the buildings that has built up and is capturing moisture against the stone
- After new roof is installed, install new low height plants in the areas near the building.

CONCRETE FLOOR - The current concrete floor was installed during the 1982 renovations. The detail included a raised concrete curb under all the new CMU walls. Most of these walls in the locker rooms have been removed leaving rubble and raised curbs through the building interior.

Remove and replace the concrete floor as necessary to accommodate new use and layout.

INTERIOR PAINT ON TRUSSES AND ROOF DECK – While the paint on the walls is in adequate condition, the paint on the exposed steel trusses and the underside of the roof deck is chipped and peeling.

- Removed existing paint on the exposed steel trusses and underside of roof deck. Use gentlest means possible with the ability to capture all removed paint.
- Consider using dry ice blasting to remove paint in a way that is gentle and provides the ability to capture all removed paint.
- Confirm if the paint contains lead and follow all Federal, State and Local regulations regarding lead paint removed and practices.
- · Repaint as needed.

MECHANICAL SYSTEM – the only systems currently in the buildings are exhaust fans in the locker rooms. A reuse of the building will require the installation of new heating and cooling system. New bathrooms will require active ventilation.

Install new heating, air conditioning and ventilation in the building appropriate for the new use.

ELECTRICAL SYSTEMS – With the reuse of the building it will be more effective to install a new electrical system. The existing primary service to the building can be reused.

- Install new electrical distribution, power receptacles and lighting.
- Install new exterior lighting around the building.
- Install emergency lighting, exit signs, etc.
- Install new smoke alarm and fire detection system

PLUMBING SYSTEMS – The existing building has an extensive plumbing system that supported shower, toilets, and sinks for high volume locker rooms. The majority of water and sewer lines are under the concrete slab. It is also important to recognize that the main water service for the swimming pool complex enters through this building.

- Provide new plumbing system for new use including water distribution, fixtures, sewer/waste, and venting.
- Provide new electric water heaters. Given the new use, this can may be handled by a single water heater.
- Ensure protection of the main water main into the building that serves the entire complex. Ensure access to the any required water shut off valves.




- Requires the least amount of change and the re-use of much of the central core dating from the gut and renovations in the 1980s.
- Each public use space has a kitchenette with a refrigerator, sink, and counter space.
- Each space has a basic storage room.
- Each space has one toilet room that is specific to that space and cannot be shared.

Option B: The Optimal Use


- This option offers two large public use spaces that can be utilized at the same time.
- The central core dating from the 1980s is completely removed. In its place is a right-sized Utility Room, Storage areas larger than option A, and two shared toilet rooms accessible from the common vestibule.
- Having the toilet rooms in the vestibule offers more privacy to visitors and allows for all the toilet rooms to be shared regardless of which public spaces is being used.
- Each public use space has a kitchenette with a refrigerator, sink, and counter space.
- All the plumbing and utilities is concentrated in the central area.
- A janitor's sink can be provided to help with maintenance of the building





Rendering showing new accessible entrance, restoration of the windows, and updated landscaping




Tuhey Pool Bathhouse Reuse - Option A









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Tuhey Pool Bathhouse Reuse - Option B


